A TASTE OF FLINDERS PACKS A FULL FLAVOURED PUNCH

We take a peek into Bass Strait's most underrated foodie haven and meet the local producers who grow, craft and brew mouth-watering produce.

Ever eaten a crayfish so tender and succulent it literally melts in your mouth?

How about abalone sold by the very diver who found it, the one who gently scooped it from the seabed?

Sure supermarket fare is quick and easy when you are on the go. However, as a traveller, there's nothing better than stumbling across locally sourced, well-priced foodstuff.

On Flinders Island—a little gem off Tasmania with crystal waters, clean beaches and craggy terrain—a new store-within-a-store is bringing the best of Bass Strait to one easy destination. Search out A Taste of Flinders – a whole new gastronomic experience.

Paddock, Sea and Garden to Plate

Jo Youl is the founder of A Taste of Flinders (formerly Flinders Island Fresh), a marketplace for showcasing seasonal local produce and home cooked delights, preserves, coffee, water and boutique liquors.

Jo launched the company in 2015 to promote local makers under a single banner, celebrating what she proudly dubs a paddock, sea and garden to plate philosophy. In April this year, A Taste of Flinders expanded from an online store into the real world. Headquartered in Whitemark, your eyes will sparkle and your senses will delight in the treasures to be found within. You can find anything from gin, vodka, sparkling and wine to honey, preserves and ultra-fresh produce. Pick up a coffee to-go or grab a quick smoko lunch or dinner—slow cooked and completely homemade.

Jo says "It's a bit of an untapped goldmine here. The variety is incredible. While we have some very premium goods, we try to keep it as affordable as possible."

You'll find no activated almonds in A Taste of Flinders offering. Absent too are other suspiciously faddy foods and all the trendy jargon that traditionally comes with organic stuff.

No, there's something pure and raw about the produce found and sold on Flinders rugged landmass. It's created without fuss or pretension, grown and tended to by regular, hardworking people. It's beef, lamb, mutton and seafood. It's chutneys and jams made from apricots, pears and figs. It's coffee - Furneaux Coffee, to be precise—which has been hand-roasted on the island, using premium green beans sourced from around the world. "If you get chatting to caffeine-mad locals, you'll hear them call it the Fairhaven Blend"

Jo says.

It's all in the making and tasting

Everything in the collective's repertoire has been handpicked for two reasons: how it's made and how it tastes.

"The thing I love about our growers and gatherers is the breadth of their knowledge—they are so familiar with the Islands terrain and its waters" says Youl, with a smile.

"There are only about 800 locals here, and they know the intricacies of the landscape as well as they know themselves. They are not part of giant conglomerates or working with thousands of employees. They run businesses that are personal and respectful of the land. Often, they are just producing a single thing like chilli-stuffed hot sauce or amazing sticky Manuka honey that comes from hives on the islands native Tea-Tree. And you know, I think that focus makes for a better product. They have been making the same organic, delicious thing for years, perfecting it every time. The specialisation- I'm so in awe of it."



Head to the A Taste of Flinders website and you'll read it's all about untouched basics. "That's only half true. While the produce you'll find in the shop is so local and delectable you'll want to update your forwarding mail address, the process and thinking behind it is the opposite of basic. There's a pair of expertly trained hands behind the scenes every time, working to ensure better results and a more sustainable future."

Take Straitwater, for instance. Bottled in glass, this sparkling, unblemished drinking water is collected as 100% rainwater by locals Mick and Liz Grimshaw. Their use of glass is deliberate. Mick—a surfer, diver and all-round beach lover—knows all too well the devastating impacts of litter.

Millions of tonnes of throwaway, non-biodegradable plastics are filling our seas. One recent study estimated it's the equivalent of 136 billion milk jugs every year! Much of this sea-trash actually originates on land and is swept to bigger water bodies during heavy rainstorms and sewer overflows.

The Grimshaws are hoping to make the island plastic container free, one bottle at a time.

"We have this beautiful landscape around us and we are ruining it" Mick explains. "Animals end up swimming in garbage, sometimes they actually ingest it. Plastic is a big offender, because it takes so long to break down. With Straitwater, we are doing our little bit to reduce all that plastic waste."

Liz and I encourage people to return the bottles to us, so we can wash and reuse them. The air is so clean here, and the rainwater is so pure, it's crazy no one beat us to the idea!"

Jack Wheatley, the last remaining solo cray fisher on Flinders Island, is another master of his craft whose work is small-scale and sustainable. Jack comes from a proud line of fisherman, with a father, grandfather and great-grandfather wedded to the sea.

As a kid, he used to row the dinghies out with his brothers and race across the bay. As an adult, he jumps quickly across rocks at low tide, climbs into an aluminium tinnie and heads out from the islands west coast. Each day, the salty old-timer keeps moving until his tiny boat reaches the perfect place. He'll thrust a large, wooden craypot overboard.

The story is just beginning

"The options we have now are just the beginning" explains Jo. "Around these parts, King Island is probably known best for local produce. On Flinders we have been cultivating the earth and sea for decades too. It's about time every visitor treats their taste-buds to the delicacies that the island offers."

A Taste of Flinders is located next to the Butcher Shop-3 Walker Street, Whitemark.

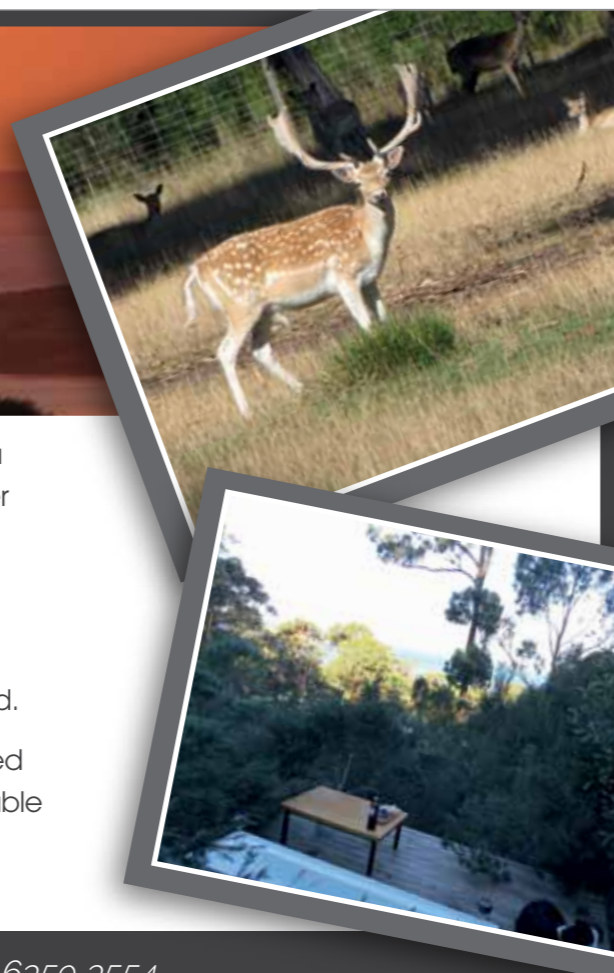

What is the Bonney Upwelling?

Spring winds kick off a remarkable time in the waters off the coast of Portland. Through a combination of dynamic environmental events, these waters become the richest marine feeding area in Australia – the Bonney Upwelling.

From November to May, cold nutrient rich water 'wells up' from the deep sea floor onto the continental shelf where sunlight converts the nutrients into food for a huge variety of marine animals.

The cold plume of the Bonney Upwelling extends from Cape Nelson, near Portland into South Australian waters. As the Upwelling season progresses, food becomes more and more abundant, with krill swarms becoming larger and denser and predators becoming more numerous. The Upwelling not only supports this amazing array of life, but also the fishing industry that is so important to our local community.

Song of the Eels

Eighteen schools across the Glenelg Shire will participate in this year's Upwelling Festival major community art project 'Song of the Eels'. In the weeks leading up to the Festival, puppeteer Jenny Ellis held a series of workshops across the Glenelg Shire region. The first part of the workshop focussed on discussion about the journey of migratory eels and where life starts as gelatinous larvae far out in the ocean. The second part involved puppet making. The last stage of the process, the performance aspect, incorporated some choreography of basic movements for the parade.

Locals lead the charge

Leading the charge at this year's festival is the enigmatic originals six-piece band cunningly titled 40° South. Playing their first ever gig at the Festival of King Island in 2015, the band was immediately embraced by the crowd. Since then the band has played many gigs in many venues and they always entertain with their mix of roots rock n roll, ballads and ukulele driven anthems.

40° South

40° South came from within the creative brain and musical talents of singer/songwriter Tim Woodburn and out of a shed, turned music studio, built by local music enthusiast Wade Roskam.

Tim is a slightly mad ex Englishman who visited King Island on holiday with his wife, the equally talented Clare Woodburn, and they fell in love with this little paradise. The connection they felt and the lifestyle the offered, made it all too easy and the Woodburn's promptly settled on the northern end of the island.

Playing at a cultural gig Tim met the slightly madder ex Dutch navy and radio man Wade. Together they hatched a plot to organise a band that would provide the soundtrack for the island and for songs that Tim had written and was still writing.

Wade's next door neighbour, Tim Leo, was drafted in to play the drums and provide the wit and backing vocals, and play them beautifully he did. Together they worked

on the foundation of the songs. Guitarist Troy Smith offered his services and was promptly recruited to fill the rhythm sound out. Ongoing work resulted in a tune entitled One Strum Street, and the band was ready for some blasts of icing on the musical cake.

The band found the secret ingredient in Charles Pearce who added all types of saxophone, flugel horn, clarinet, trumpet, harmonica, saxophone and backing vocals to the songs. The band was really starting to fly now. In stepped Roslyn Pearce who joyfully added backing vocals and percussion. Now they just needed that elusive bass player. Lachlan Clarke (how's your week been) originally ably filled the bass slot out but sadly he had to move off island. Another local musician Jarrod Reeman was recruited and did a sweet job but he too left the island. Talented local drummer Daniel Baer offered to learn the bass, and has become a valued member of the group.

Months of rehearsals and indulging in the generosity of the King Island music studio twice a week had the band getting tight and eventually fifteen original songs were ready to be presented to the public.

40° South dabbled in the recording studio until finding their feet with producer Tim Webb from Windup Studios in January of 2016. Tim came to the island and brought with him a wealth of knowledge, an easy going but hard working vibe and is a fantastic musician and production whizz. The songs were laid down over a period of 3 weeks before an exacting mixing process took place.



The "two Tim's" were perfectionists with their art. The result on the album speaks for itself!

The songs truly reflect the trials and tribulations that are generated within a small community living with a wild isolation. They hold dear to the idyllic green lifestyle, the swell of the blue seas and they chronicle local events that are all intertwined with lyrical lashings of life love and loss, 40° South style. The band stretches out the catchy lyrics and baritone vocals with a rock steady beat, solid guitars, gilded harmonies and a blast of horns that have them rocking out of Bass Strait like a ghost ship waiting to be discovered.

Discover 40° South! The band will release their exciting debut album 'Made in King Island' in Spring 2016.

Come to the King

King Island has long been known for its wild beaches, surf breaks, seafood, beef and cheeses. The island paradise is also fast becoming a golfing mecca and a destination for those who feel the need to get back to nature and de-stress from the rigours of their lives. In amongst the Islanders are groups of musicians who are finding their muse, polishing their musical roots and creating their own unique brand of roots/rock music. The aptly named "the Local band", Clare Woodburn, Phil Smith, Troy Smith (aka Rusty Falcon) are all song writing and most are in various stages of recording.

KING ISLAND RACING CARNIVAL

Where the surf meets the turf

Humble Beginnings

The King Island Racing Club Carnival is one of the few remote regional racing events that have continually operated for more than 100 years. The first meeting was held on 1st January 1892 on land at Porky Flat, down the road from the site of the famous King Island Dairy Cheese factory. Two races were followed by a turkey lunch and an afternoon of various sporting events. Many different courses were used until the present site was established on the outskirts of Currie.

Most of the races were flat races and hurdles with the first harness race introduced in 1896. With no professional jockeys, the ability of both horse and riders was the guide; riders being the owner or his son or a worker. Membership cost ten shillings and sixpence. At the time wallaby skins were selling for fourteen shillings a dozen, and sometimes the payments were made in wallaby skins. As time went on, more of King Islands settlers joined in and by 1910 there were up to 500 in attendance at the meetings.

Racing on King Island has become an important social and community sporting event. The popularity of the races over the years has become autonomous with a greater number of visitors to the island attending the racing days. The King Island Racing Club Inc. members and volunteers are proud of the longevity of the event.

A True Community Event

Today the isolated hard working and remote King Island community comprises around 1500 residents and is, predominantly, agricultural with beef and dairy farming along with a thriving cray fishing industry. For six months of the year they make time in their busy lives to enjoy the fun of the horse racing calendar. New roles emerge: wharfies become trainers and stewards, school teachers become strappers, farmers become racing officials, trainers, race recorders, finish photo operators and judges, tourism operators become drivers, children become camera operators and stable hands.

The Carnival

Seven meetings are held over the season. The King Island Galloping Cup and the King Island Harness Cup are both held on New Year's Day. Over the Christmas Carnival period the population on the Island increases by up to 30% with the majority of both locals and visitors attending at least one day of the programme. At this time of the year ex-locals, young and old, return to the island for family get togethers. School reunions are set for this time of the year and always earmark a day at the races as part of their celebrations. We even had a couple celebrate the start of their honeymoon with a day at the races last year.

The Carnival is a very professionally run operation supported by an efficient team of local volunteers, with a visiting steward from Tasracing to assist in the overall operations. Jockeys fly in for thoroughbred riding. Race caller Peter Gilligan and bookie, Howie Culph fly in each race day to support the races, whilst harness drivers are all local owner/drivers.

The King Island Racing Club Inc. is proud to operate with the support and sponsorship of local businesses. 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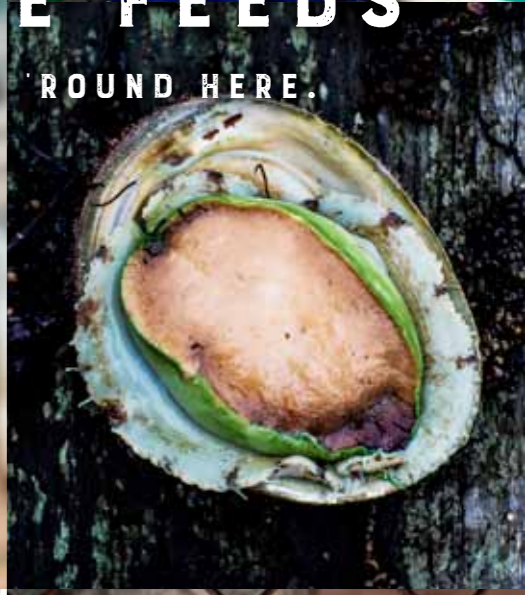

Escape the Hustle and Bustle

On Flinders Island, you'll feel far removed from the hustle and bustle of city life. For those seeking to feel even more away from it all, the beautiful North East River inlet and rocky point on the island's north eastern tip is the place to go. A great spot for boating, fishing, swimming, beachcombing, photography or just chilling out on a lovely bit of coast.

"The remoteness of the far corner of an island in Bass Strait appealed to me, especially having just spent some time in Melbourne. I've heard it joked that Flinders Island is where rural Tasmanians go for a less hectic lifestyle - this being an unkind jab at the island's quiet lifestyle by mainlanders who regard Tasmania as a sleepy backwater. If Flinders Island is that tranquil, then its most isolated beauty spot could be a great antidote to city living.

Getting there involves heading north from Whitemark up the main road traversing the west coast, along the one and only road to the north end, passing the roads to Killiecrankie and Palana. The traffic free, gravel road passes through the rolling countryside and bush.

Occasional fence lines remind you the area isn't a deserted wilderness.

At the end of the road, a short walk up what remained of the track brought me to the promontory. On the right, a lovely panorama of the broad waters of the North East River where it turns a bend and creeps into the sea, surrounded by some attractive stretches of beach. On the left, nearest the picnic and toilet facilities, a north-facing beach overlooks a bay with a wooded headland at the other end, and views of small islands. In between, the promontory ends in rocky outcrops with pools and views which just have to be explored.

The north-facing beach was also beautiful, but rather windy when I was there, unlike the inlet. That illustrated a convenient feature of the area - whatever the wind direction you can probably find somewhere that's relatively sheltered. The often changeable weather of Flinders Island varied from kind and sunny to dark and threatening, creating the sort of light and mood changes which keep photographers hanging around.

After much loitering I did eventually leave, glad that I'd made the effort to visit such a lovely spot and feeling like I really had "got away from it all."

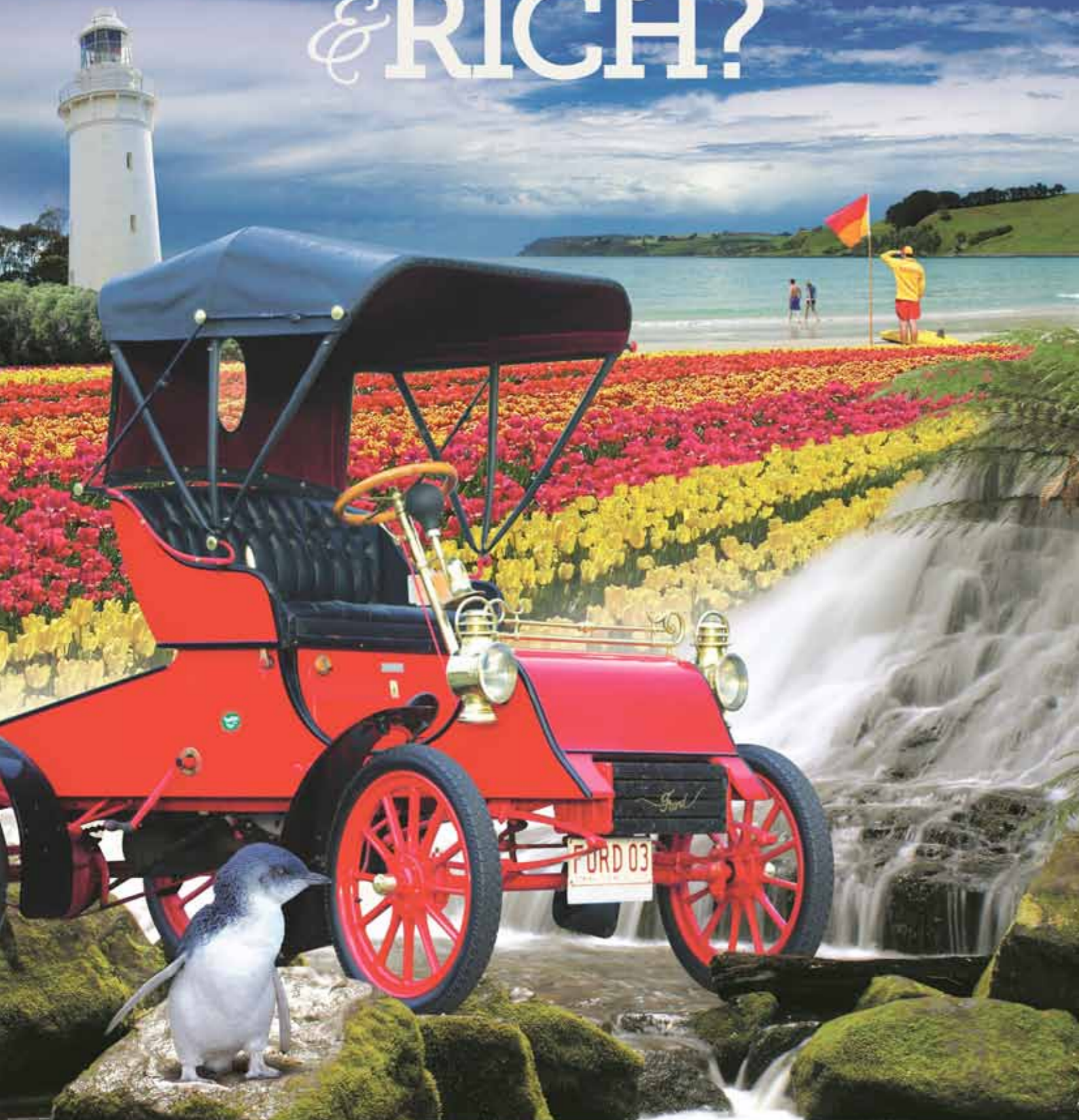
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SHARP FLYER NUMBER 10,000 COMES ON BOARD

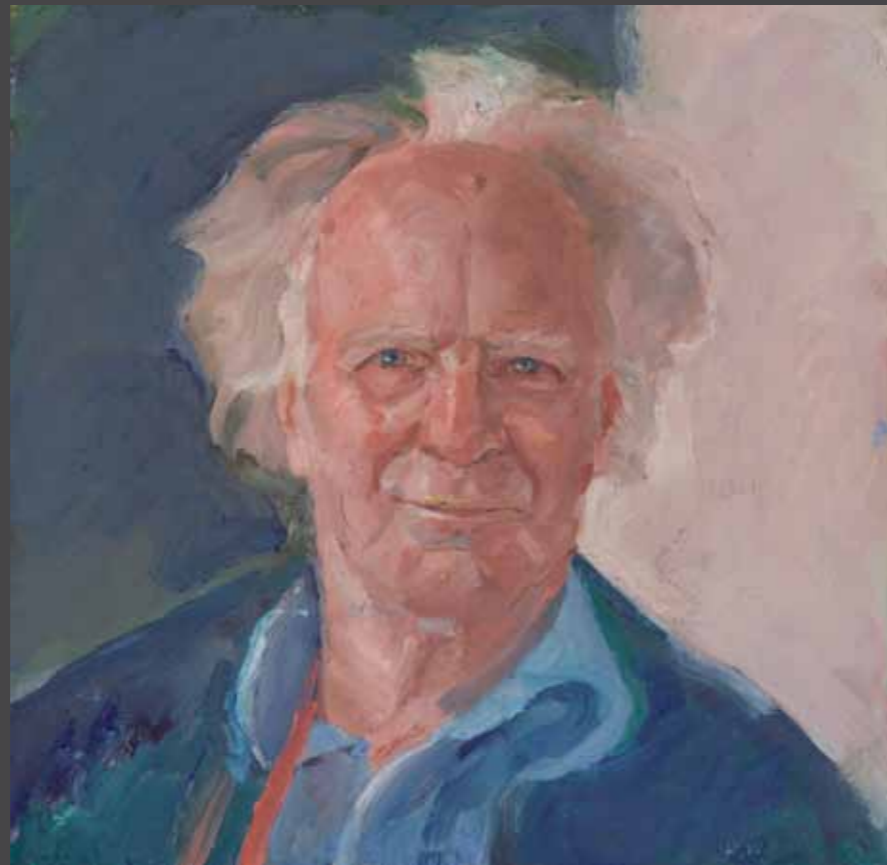

The Prize

The Archibald Prize, first awarded in 1921, is Australia's favourite art award, and one of its most prestigious. Awarded to the best portrait painting, it's a who's who of Australian culture, from politicians to fashion designers, sporting heroes to artists.

Since 1921, the Archibald Prize has been thrilling art enthusiasts, often stirring up controversy and always challenging the way we see ourselves and our society. Over the years, the Prize has been awarded to many of Australia's most prominent artists including Nora Heysen, William Dobell, Brett Whiteley, Ben Quilty, Tim Storrier and Fiona Lowry.

Who was JF Archibald?

JF Archibald (1856-1919) was a journalist and founder of the Bulletin magazine, who also served as a trustee of the Art Gallery of NSW.

He is the man behind one of Australia's oldest and best known art prizes for portraiture. Yet Archibald had no desire to become famous and, during his lifetime, shunned publicity and remained evasive and enigmatic. A portrait of him, commissioned by the Art Gallery of NSW trustees, was made after his death and remains as one of the pictorial records of a man who avoided having his photograph taken.

The journalist

Archibald was born in Victoria and christened with the name John Feltham. When he was 15, he started his career in journalism on a country newspaper in Warrnambool, Victoria. His passion for newspapers led him to Melbourne, searching for work in 'the big smoke'. He lived a bohemian life, frequenting Melbourne's city boarding houses, streets, theatres and cafes – a life he imagined to be quite European, which led him to change his name to Jules François and later to leave

money in his will for a large fountain to be built in the middle of Sydney's Hyde Park to commemorate the association of France and Australia in World War I.

Realising the power of print, in 1880 he and a friend founded the Bulletin magazine, a radical journal for its time, addressing issues of nationhood, culture and identity. This journal was influential in shaping opinions and raising issues in the public's consciousness. He also employed the best young artists to be its illustrators.

The art supporter

Archibald's interest in art led him in his later years to serve as a trustee for the Art Gallery of NSW, keen to promote the work of younger artists and writers. In 1900, he commissioned Melbourne portrait artist John Longstaff to paint a portrait of poet Henry Lawson for 50 guineas. Apparently he was so pleased with this portrait that he left money in his will for an annual portrait prize, which was first awarded in 1921. His primary aim was to foster portraiture, as well as support artists and perpetuate the memory of great Australians.

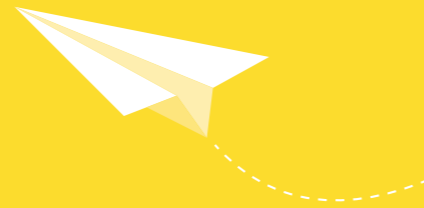
